But teach him also that for every scoundrel there is a hero: that for every selfish politician. there is a dedicated leader ... Teach him that for every enemy there is a friend. It will take time. I know; but teach him. if you can, that a dollar earned is of far more value than five found... Teach him to learn to lose and also to enjoy winning Steer him away from envy, if you can. Teach him the secret of quiet laughter. Let him learn early that the bullies are the easiest to lick. Teach him. if you can, the wonder of books but also give him guiet time to ponder over the eternal mystery of birds in the sky, bees in the sun, and flowers on a green hill-side. In school teach him it is far more honourable to fail than to cheat. Teach him to have faith in his own ideas, even if everyone tells him they are wrong... 
